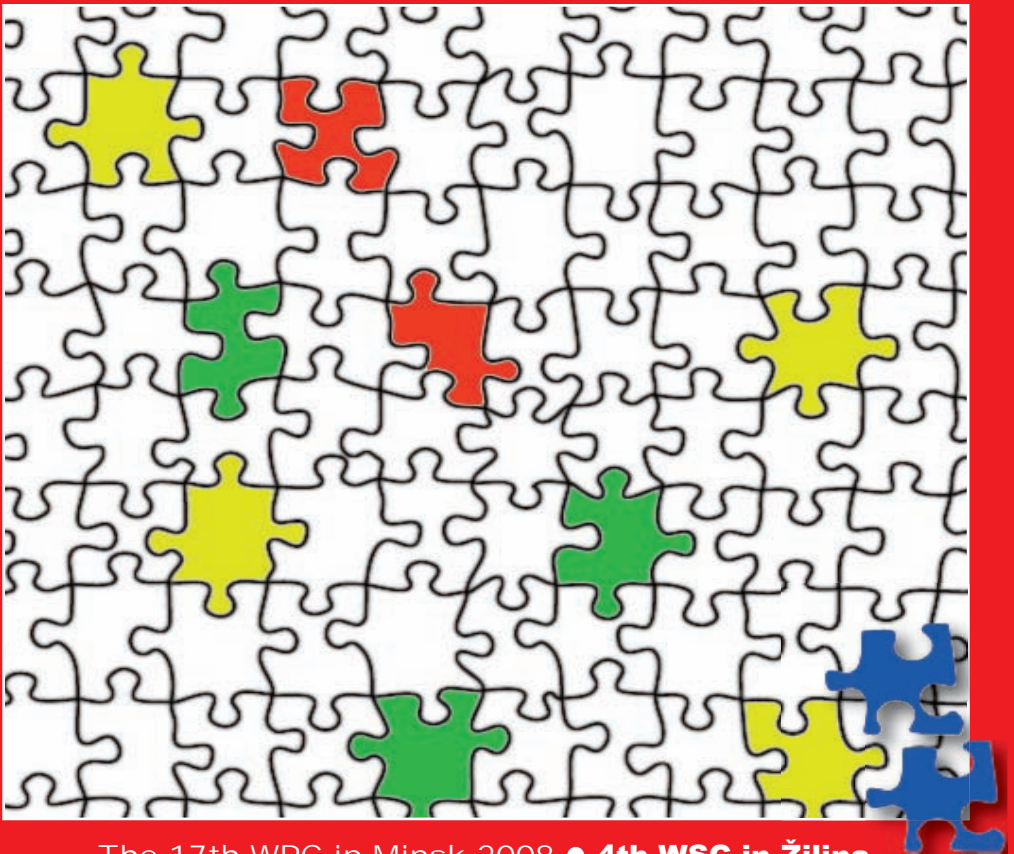


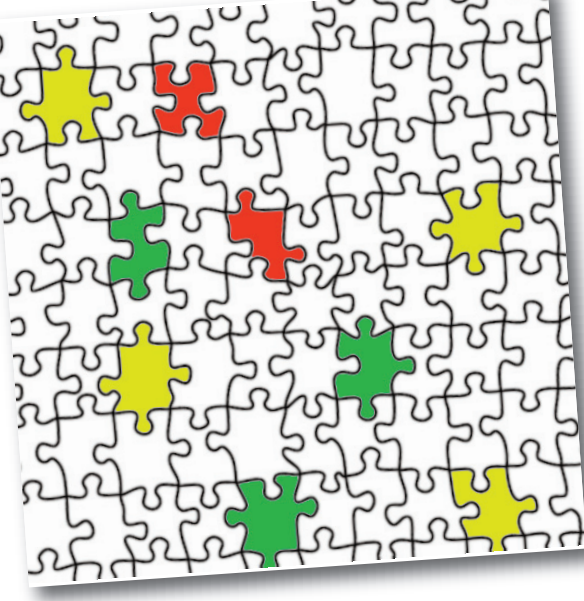

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Editorial

Two major events took place in last twelve months. During the last week of October 2008, Minsk, the capital of Belarus, hosted the best puzzlers from all over the world at the 17th World Puzzle Championship. It was an exciting competition, as usual. The General Assembly of the WPF announced a very important decision – that from the year 2011 on, WPC and WSC will be held simultaneously. Obviously, two major events every year constitute a significant financial burden for many teams. With this new formula the standard WPC will undergo some changes, and it will definitely be a challenge for future organizers.

In April 2009, the 4th WSC took place in the town of Žilina in Slovakia and a new name surfaced among the best world puzzlers. Jan Mrozowski of Poland became the new champion in solving sudoku puzzles.

Philadelphia and Warsaw respectively were chosen to host the WSC and WPC in 2010. Preparations for these two events are under way.

But, before that, welcome to Antalya, Turkey, where the 18th WPC is just about to start.

See you there on November 3rd. The best of luck to all teams!

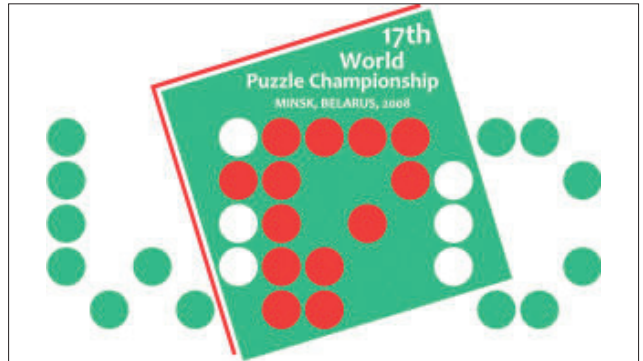

The 17th WPC Minsk 2008

The 17th World Puzzle Championship showed that real puzzle enthusiasts do exist. Though it was planned to be held in Vilnius, Lithuania, the location of the venue changed quite suddenly. So here we are in Minsk, Belarus, at the 17th WPC with the help of a pretty famous puzzlemaker, Vladimir Portugalov, who by necessity had to play the part of organizer this time.

The event

The most important global action in the world of puzzles took place in Minsk, the capital of Belarus, from the 27th of October to the 1st of November 2008. The chosen venue was the hotel Belarus, located in the centre of Minsk in a picturesque place near the bank of the Svisloch, the river that crosses the whole city. You just needed to enter the hotel to feel the atmosphere of a big brain challenge about to happen. The hall was full of puzzlers, sitting and training their brains again and again: different sorts of sudoku, logical, math problems. So that's how the first day began. In the evening a



traditional welcome party took place. It was heartwarming to see such a lovely reunion of old friends.

The second day was mainly occupied with a trip to the village and museum Dudutki, where puzzlers had fun exploring the mysteries of ancient Belarusian handicrafts and tasting the national cuisine.

WPC business came after pleasure but not instead of. The third day – time for the official opening and competition. Just a few interesting facts for a start. The 17th World Puzzle Championship had a local team for a debut! The Belarusian team was selected according to the results of the 7th Belarusian Puzzle Championship. Hopefully, this

beginning will have a continuation.

But, let's go back to the competition, or rather, to the puzzles. The logo for the 17th World Puzzle Championship was designed as a multiple-unit image that consisted of three main symbols: the number "17," the letters "WPC" and the colours green and red to match the colours of the Belarus national flag. This logo dominated as a pattern for all the puzzles in the "Welcome" part of the competition. No surprise, because the logo was created by Vladimir Portugalov, who also was the author of some puzzles for this WPC. Most of the puzzles were created by the famous Russian puzzlemakers Andrey Bogdanov and Olga

Leontieva. And they succeeded in making pretty tough puzzles, a good brain workout. Some participants spent about 40 minutes for one puzzle and their solutions were wrong. But most of the puzzle players appreciated the puzzles at their true value. Also there were 17 participants in the Individual final.

Of course the most impressive was the tour of mechanical puzzles. In one task, teams had to assemble different wooden elements into a certain figure. The shape of this very figure was a model of the Belarusian National Library building, a polyhedron that looks like a diamond.

The results

I remember the words of Will Shortz about a potential winner of the WPC: "To be successful at this championship your mind has to be very logical, you have to think fast and be very careful." The three-day competition discovered the quickest and the most careful puzzler – Ulrich Voight, who got his title back again. He managed to win with a break of almost 200 points. In second place, Mehmet Murat Sevim from Turkey, and in third place, Roger Barkan from the USA, who were quite close to each other by only 25 points.

In spite of a quite tricky finals system (first 17 participants got to play off) the distribution of prize places

stayed the same as after the preliminary parts. There were no such surprises like at the previous Championship in Rio de Janeiro.

The USA team won for the third year in a row, a record at the WPC. This was their 11th team victory as a whole. The most serious competition for the American dream team was from Japan and the Czech Republic. The noob-team from Belarus could take only the 16th place. [Valter, what is that term noob-team? Is it correct? Does it mean new team?]

The team of organizers

The 17th WPC was organized by a group of real enthusiasts that simply love creating puzzles. Vladimir Portugalov (Belarus), Andrey Bogdanov and Olga Leontieva (Russia). This time Vladimir appeared to be not only a brilliant puzzlemaker but more importantly, a brave man. He had only four months to organize such a global action, but he succeeded very well. Actually, Vladimir Portugalov was the first one in Belarus who went in for puzzles on a professional level; he started training pupils and students, organizing local championships. Two Russian puzzle mak-

ers, Andrey Bogdanov and Olga Leontieva, were involved more in creating puzzles for the championship and checking solutions. Both of them take part in organizing the most important Russian events, championships in the puzzle sphere. For example, the Moscow Puzzle Cup and the Russian Puzzle/Sudoku Championship. Also, Andrey is a four-time Russian Puzzle Champion.

Goodbye, Minsk!

The results of the WPC are not the main part of the competition. It was an incredible week, both for participants and organizers. So many unusual and clever people from different parts of the world gathered in one place for a short period of time. Communication, mutual exchange of ideas, experiences – those things do matter even more.

Now to say a few words about the farewell party and finish the report. On Friday all the participants, guests, WPF members and organizers gathered at the restaurant Panorama to celebrate. The restaurant is located on the 22nd floor of the hotel, and the view from each window was just amazing. So was the atmosphere of celebration. Vladimir Portugalov said some emotional goodbye words, congratulated champions and presented their prizes, and gave souvenirs to each participant. Time to say goodbye and see you in Turkey!

Exactly these words were the beginning of presentation which gave the opportunity to organize WSC 2009 in Slovakia. Organizers prepared not only the competition to win the title but also fun, humour and several surprises for friends gathered together through the hobby called sudoku.

This hobby absorbed altogether 166 participants from 28 countries and Canada, Vietnam, Pakistan, Philippines, Bangladesh, Colombia, Malaysia and Romania called off the participation because of different, mainly financial causes. Except organizers, there was also a contribution of tasks from authors from Japan, Korea, Singapore, Russia and Great Britain. Championship in Slovakia itself was groundbreaking in many moments. Thanks to Morocco Africa took part in for the first time in history of WPC or WSC. Belarus and Luxem-

bourg, represented only in competition of individuals up to now, took part in competition of teams this time.

But let's go in the order. Preliminary round, focused on the classics, was the best for 2-fold world champion Thomas Snyder from the USA, who immediately established a promising lead over other competitors. The second round with symbols of Maya, Roman and digital digits all minions managed equally. In the third snowman round Thomas solidified his leadership and after him an-

other group got split. There were following competitors: Jan Mrozovski (POL), Jakub Ondroušek and Ján Novotný (both CZE), Guarav Korde (IND), Jocelyn Bogreau and Frédérique Rogeaux (both FRA), Vincent Bertrand (BEL) and Hideaki Jo (JAP).

This was followed by an attempt to overcome the world record of fastest solving of sudoku. This idea rised as a reaction for Guinness records in composing of Rubik cube and rules were also taken from requirements of Institution of Guinness records. So the



task has these rules: it is the classic sudoku 9x9, every number from 1 to 9 must be used exactly three times, in every row, column and box 3x3 are presented exactly 3 numbers and the stage of intensity is on hard level. Slovaks organized the constituting attempt (Pavel Jaselský 5:25) as the part of national championship in 2008 with the participation of solvers from Hungary, Poland and Czech Republic. It was being awaited, that time would be overcome, but it would also need a lot of experience and luck as well. However, a wonderful surprise came. By nobody favoured Belgian competitor Vincent Bertrand reached time 3:06 about which it will be spoken as about the time from another planet for quite a long time. Talented 18 years old Belgian overcame all champions by almost 3 minutes, because the second fastest time of record mind bender in world championship was 5:58.

Thomas Snyder (USA) was still ahead of others, there was an equal trinity after him - Vincent Bertrand (BEL), Ján Novotný (CZE) and Jan Mrozowski (POL). The best 36 competitors got to semi final, creating 4 groups. According to principle of athletic runs, winner of each group got to a final round and next 4 participants from the rest with the best result and time of handing out got there as well. Those who forgot about tactics missed the final. Unusual

rules were criticized by some participants after competition, but there was no complaining about this system before competition despite the fact, that rules were published 4 months before championship.

So this meant that leader did not get to final round, but those, who were able to fight and tactically manage the rules of semi final at the same time, did so. The best eight finally competed in dramatic and emotional fight in front of views of everybody else. 100% concentration and seconds decided. The winner could be only one and that was.

The news of championship was also separate competition of teams. The team consisted of three contestants from the same country - mixed teams were not allowed. The results of individuals did not count already and if a country had created more national teams, the only result that counted was the best one out of all of them. The aim of it was to show real unity and ability to work together between particular members and to uncover strengths but also weak sides of team and so the result of team was not based on result of the best individual in the group as it used to be up till now. The

team Poland 1 started the competition as the best one, France 1 and Czech Republic, champions from the previous year, were closely after him. The team Hungary 1 seconded greatly in next round and they immediately reached the first place. Teams had to manage in unusual relay, which reminded of athletic runs, where a mistake of one player resulted in loss of whole team. The biggest loss because of that was in the team of the USA, who lost all needed points and also a real possibility of winning the title of champion - all because of a little mistake in the first task. Slovaks and the teams of Serbia and Czech Republic acquitted themselves well in the first task though. In round called "a strategy", Japanese started with offense. However, if they had not made a mistake, they would have attacked the first place.

Cube 4D sudoku, which was the news watched by media, was presented at the end and it was shown for the first time just in the fourth world championship. However, organizers did not avoid particular problems that stemmed from news, which they wanted to offer all participants of WSC. As one of the foreign captains said: "Slovak organizers chose their own way and showed us that a lot of things could be done differently and more interestingly. However, only time will show, which ones of these innovating ideas will last longer." Well let surprise us next year in American city Philadelphia.

Portrait Of The Champion

It wasn't too big a surprise for the world of Sudoku when Jan Mrozowski – a 22-year-old student from Krakow, Poland, won the 4th World Sudoku Championship in April 2009 in Zilina.

Everyone had known that only a few people were able to beat Thomas Snyder during the 4th WSC. Jan Mrozowski was among them. So he was one of challengers.

He was recognized in Poland as a strong Sudoku solver during the 1st Polish Sudoku Championship. He competed a second time but he made one mistake in one of four puzzles and finally he took 32nd place. It was the last time that he didn't take first place in an important Polish Sudoku competition.

He won 2nd, 3rd and 4 Polish Sudoku championship and several other competitions. In 2006 Jan took second place in the OnLine World Sudoku Championship 2006.

He took 18th place at the 11 World Sudoku Championship, which made him recognized as a strong Sudoku solver in WPF area – because he took 2nd place in the second round and 3rd place in the fourth round

(there were 5 individual rounds).

He is also a very good solver in other puzzles. He took 33rd place at the XVII World Puzzle Championship in Minsk. He won XIII Polish Puzzle Championship in September 2009.

Mrozowski is very quick solver and, what is also important, he solves puzzles in a very simple way. It is difficult to believe, but he solves puzzles in his head and not on the paper. The answer sheet is, for him, only a device to

write down the results of solving. His answer sheet is always clean with only a few additional marks or none at all.

This happened during 4th World Sudoku Championship. I asked him after one of the rounds, "Janek, how is it going?"

"I made a mistake in second puzzle," he answered.

"And what?," I asked.

"Nothing. I reviewed in my mind the eleven steps, corrected the numbers and found the correct solution."

Report

ON THE 10TH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE WORLD PUZZLE FEDERATION

Minsk, Belarus, October 28 - 29, 2008

The meeting was called to order by chairman Vítězslav Koudelka (Czech Republic) on October 28 at 15:30. Other board members present were Peter Ritmeester, general secretary (Netherlands); Will Shortz, treasurer (USA); and Valter Kvalic (Croatia).

The WPF member countries present for all or part of the congress were Bulgaria, Croatia, Czech Republic, Estonia, Finland, Hungary, Japan, Netherlands, Poland, Romania, Serbia, Slovakia, Turkey, and United States. Belgium, China, Denmark, France, and Italy were represented by proxy. The meeting was held in three sessions over two days.

Vítězslav opened the meeting by welcoming the participants. The delegates introduced themselves and identified the organizations they represent.

The agenda for the meeting as presented by the board was approved.

Will made a correction in the minutes of the 9th General Assembly of the WPF, as printed in the World Puzzle Newsletter #13. Under "Reports," item "c," it should be said that the WPF ended the

previous year with €25,835.95. With this correction, the minutes were accepted.

Reports

a) Peter discussed the reasons for the board's emergency decision to move the 2008 WPC from Vilnius, Lithuania, to Minsk, Belarus. He stressed the need in future years for potential WPC organizers to be supported by a team of helpers, both puzzle-makers and otherwise, rather than for all the work to be done by one individual. (Additional background on the board's decision appears in the newsletter, pages 14-15.)

b) Peter handed out a report on the WPF finances. The WPF has a balance of €23,430.40, with an additional €5,504.10 in the office account.

c) Vítězslav announced that the dues for 2009-10 would again be €250 per country. As always, members from wealthier countries are encouraged to pay more.

d) Will made two corrections to Newsletter #13. In the Editor's Message, page 3, it is incorrectly stated that the

WPF board determined the site of the 2009 WPC (in Antalya, Turkey); it was the WPF members who did so, by a vote conducted by email in June. Also, he said the report on the 16th WPC (page 4, column 3) contains an incorrect list of the top teams at the championship; the correct list appears on pages 21-22.

Valter was thanked for his work in editing the newsletter. He offered to edit it again for 2008-09 and requested contributions from members.

Combining the WPC and WSC

Vitezslav reopened the discussion, held over from 2007, about combining the World Puzzle Championship and World Sudoku Championship beginning in 2011.

The board presented the following options: a) keep the status quo, with two separate WPF events each year; b) have one WPF event a year, alternating WPC and WSC; c) have one WPF event a year, combining the WPC and WSC; or d) retain two WPF events each year, but with the

WSC always being held in the same location.

After much discussion the vote was: a — 1, b — 0, c — 11, d — 4. Thus, starting in 2011 the WPC and WSC will be combined.

Website redesign

Peter reported requests from several members that the WPF website should be redesigned, with more puzzle content and more puzzle news from around the world. He said, however, he doesn't have the time to do this large amount of work himself. The board asked for volunteers and said the position could include a modest stipend.

Will outlined the requirements of a WPF webmaster: The person should have a good knowledge of the WPC and puzzles in general; sufficient time to maintain the site; fluency in English; and the necessary technical expertise.

Jacek Szczap (Poland) proposed that the WPF website should include online puzzle competitions in order to spur interest in the organization. Others felt the site should be mainly informational in nature.

After discussions overnight, WPC competitor Wei-Hwa Huang (USA) volunteered for the position, and his offer was accepted.

WPF Statutes / Regulations

György Istvan (Hungary)

distributed a sheet listing, among other things, ways the WPF statutes and regulations are either out-of-date or incomplete. For example, regulation 3.2 says the WPC participation fee should be not more than US\$400, whereas the fee for all recent WPC's has been €400 (slightly more than \$400). Also, there is no provision for voting by email, which the WPF did in June. And many more similar problems.

A committee of three — György, Peter, and Will — was appointed to study the statutes and regulations and propose changes.

WPF Rules and procedures

Vitezslav announced that the WPF still needs to prepare guidelines and rules for organizing and running a WPC. A committee of five — Vitezslav, Jacek, Blanka Lehotská (Slovakia), Kamer Alyanakyen (Turkey), and Nick Baxter (USA) — was appointed to draft a proposal. It was suggested that they divide up the work in order to speed progress. Vitezslav proposed a deadline of February 28, 2009, for a first draft, to be discussed informally next April at the WSC in Zilina, Slovakia.

French Membership

Vitezslav reported that the WPF membership of Keesing, in France, was being chal-

lenged by a second organization, the Federation Française des Jeux Mathématiques et Logiques.

The WPF rules state that if two competing groups cannot agree to cooperate, the WPF will decide by vote which one would best further the WPF's interests in that country.

After overnight discussions, Keesing and the Federation Française des Jeux Mathématiques et Logiques agreed to cooperate after all, so no vote was necessary.

2008 WPC Losses

Vitezslav and Valter reported, after meeting with Vladimir Portugalov and a representative of Trans Aero, the company handling the business arrangements for the 2008 WPC, that Vladimir might personally lose up to €6,000 (exact amount not yet known) in hosting the event. The expected loss was due to the sudden decline of the value of the euro versus the Belarusian ruble since the contracts were signed, the absence of hoped-for sponsorship, and other reasons.

Usually hosts are responsible for any such loss. In this case, though — since Vladimir assumed the hosting assignment with only four months' notice — many members felt his personal loss should be reimbursed.

Nick Baxter (USA) pro-

posed that the WPF empower the board to examine the books and reimburse Vladimir up to €6,000 for any loss he personally incurred in hosting the WPC. The proposal was passed unanimously.

Election of Board members

Five people — Blanka Lehotská (Slovakia), Jacek Szczap (Poland), Kamer Alyanakyian (Turkey), Peter Ritmeester (Netherlands), and Vitezslav Koudelka (Czech Republic) — were nominated to fill the three open positions on the WPF board. Two of the positions were for three years. The third position was for one year, to complete the unexpired term of Hendrik Hardeman (India), who had stepped down.

For the first position the vote was as follows: Vitezslav — 9, Peter — 5, Blanka — 2, Jacek — 1. So Vitezslav was reelected to a three-year term.

For the second position: Peter — 12, Blanka — 4, Jacek — 1. So Peter was reelected to a three-year term.

For the third position the vote was: Blanka — 7, Kamer — 7, Jacek — 3. After eliminating the lowest vote-getter, a second vote was held: Kamer — 10, Blanka — 8. Thus, Kamer was elected to fill out Hendrik's unexpired term.

Will commended all the candidates and expressed the wish that those who weren't elected stay involved and keep contributing their ideas to the WPF.

Site Selection for the 2010 WPC

Vitezslav reported two offers to host the 2010 WPC — Poland and Serbia.

Jacek Szczap, representing the Sfinks club, made the presentation for Poland. On behalf of Zoran Tanasic (Serbia), who could not be present, Valter presented the Serbian bid.

After discussion, members voted. The first two ballots were tied. On the third ballot Poland was selected 12-10.

Site Selection for the 2010 WSC

Vitezslav reported only one offer to host the 2010 WSC — in Philadelphia, USA. Will and Nick made a presentation. The offer was accepted unanimously.

Statements from the 2009 WPC and WSC Organizers

Jan Farkas and Blanka Lehotská announced details of the 4th WSC, to be held April 23-27 in Zilina, Slovakia. It will include an optional two-day sightseeing trip before the championship. Each country will be permitted up to six competitors, with three people on a team.

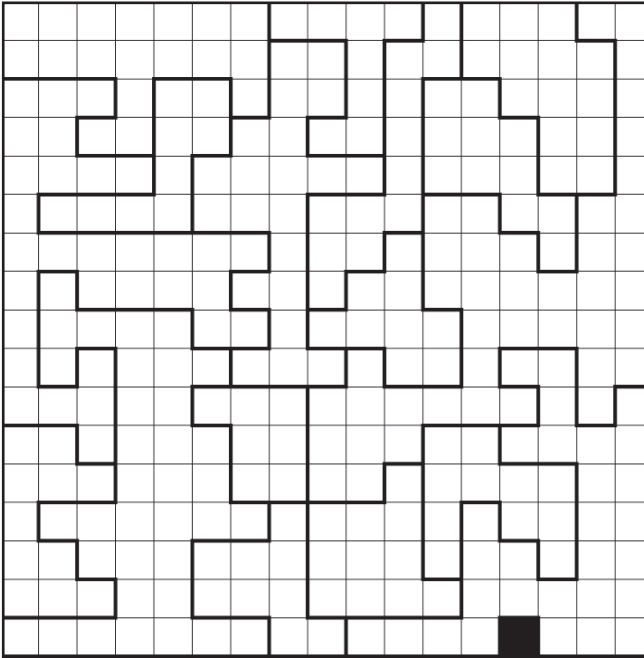
Kamer made a slide presentation regarding the 18th WPC, to be held in October or November 2009 in Antalya, Turkey.

Closing

The members thanked Vladimir Portugalov for a superb WPC, which he organized under difficult circumstances.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned on October 29 at 19:05.

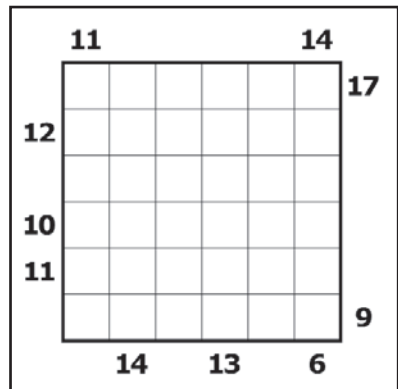

Place in the white cells the numbers one through nine, each once. Given numbers show the results of the corresponding expression. The priority of the operations is usual - first multiplication and division, then addition and subtraction ("two + two x two" equals six, not eight).

The grid symbolises a group of skyscrapers. Each row and column contains skyscrapers of different heights (one to six). The numbers outside the grid indicate the sums of the heights of all skyscrapers that are visible from that direction.



Puzzles for the visually impaired

I would like to present an open project "Puzzles for the visually impaired" aimed at the complex problem of puzzle accessibility for the visually impaired, for puzzle adaptation and the solving process, all compatible with my own original software. I would like to promote the cooperation and communication with active organizations directly involved with puzzles, especially their visually challenged members. I want to promote puzzle digitalization, special software development, testing and results validation, and the integration of visually impaired solvers into

the society of all puzzle solvers.

Reduction or loss of visual perception means, in practice, several very important differences in working with puzzles, such as the loss of being able to see the puzzle in global order (the whole puzzle in front of the eyes). Solvers with some loss of vision are able to work only locally. The structure, context, state or content of the puzzle

needs to be described with special forms, in order to provide accessible information and effective real-solving possibilities. Complex sound or speech support is the pillar for information accessibility. A puzzle for the dim-sighted in my own software is effectively magnified, with complex color and shape description. For the blind this information is effectively accessible by tactile Braille devices too.

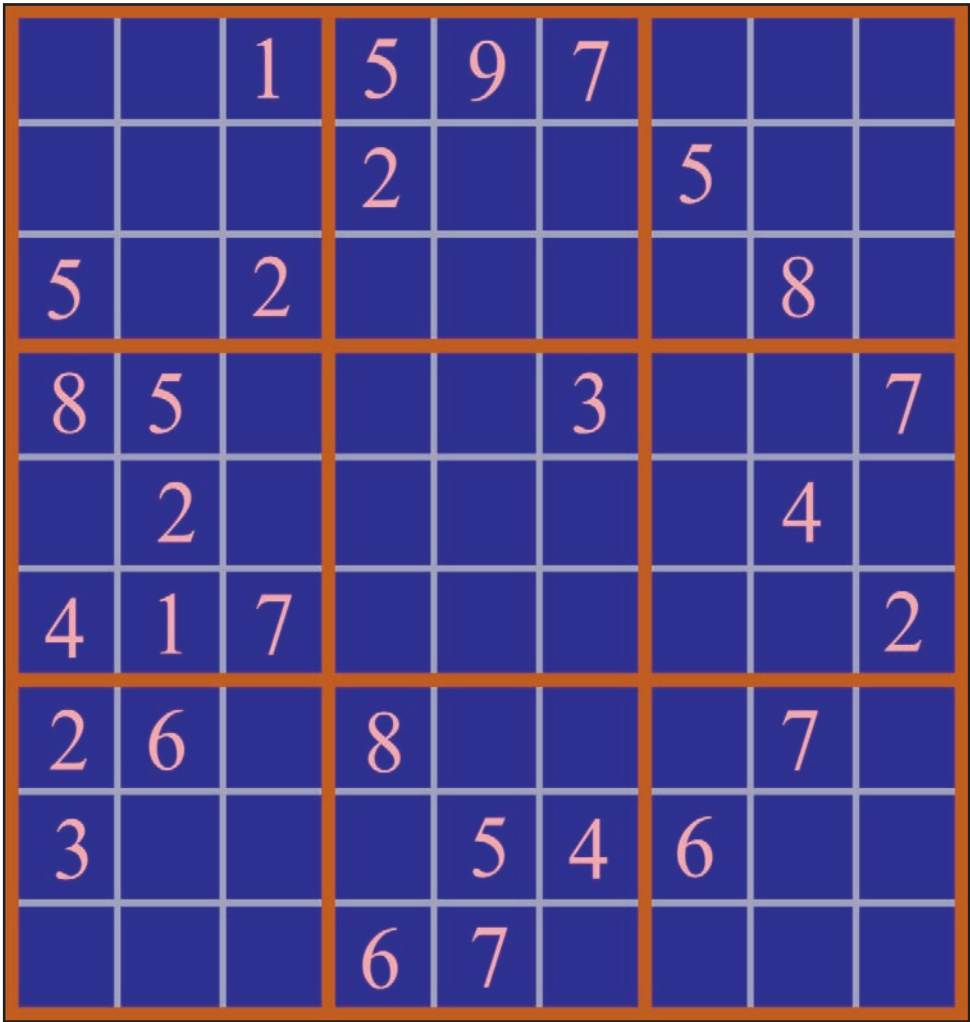
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The project Puzzles for visually impaired is aimed on complex aspect of puzzles accessibilities for visually impaired, for puzzles adaptation and solving process, in cooperation with developed software. Reduction or lost of visual perception means in practice the lost of the possibility to see the puzzle in global order (whole puzzle in front of eyes). Visually impaired is able working only locally, the structure, context, state or content of the puzzle need be described by special forms, to allow accessible information or effective real-solving possibilities. Different visually impaired has

very different needs about the puzzle presentation or forms of software assistance during solving. Complex sound or speech support is the pillar for information accessibility. The puzzle for low sighted is effectively magnified, with complex color or shape-style description. For blinds is information effectively accessible by tactile Braille-line devices too. All of these implemented support possibilities give the chance to compensate reduction or the lost of visual perception and, by own belief, to integrate visually impaired into the society of puzzles solvers.



I am approaching active solvers and organizations involved with puzzles to promote information about the project, about the chance for cooperation or communication about puzzle accessibility for the visually impaired. Different visually challenged people have very different

needs about the puzzle presentation and the software assistance possible during solving, so we would like to work with visually impaired individuals or puzzle organizations, so we can understand their individual needs and show them our own software. Your support in this project

would enable us to compensate for the reduction or loss of visual perception and, we believe, to integrate those visually impaired puzzlers fully into the society of puzzle solvers. I would like to thank you all for your cooperation.
