#### Editorial by Valter Kvalić


The single event that took place these last twelve months was the 19th World Puzzle Championship. It was held in Paprotnia, Poland. The championship itself was interesting. And for the first time, one of many splendid Japanese competitors, Taro Arimatsu, succeded in clinching the first individual title for Japan. That had to happen some day; after years of competing on the highest level, and year after year having competitors in play-offs, Taro Arimatsu won this title, not only for himself, but also for the satisfaction of many Japanese competitors who often did everything but the final winning move. In the team competition, USA team managed to win the title ahead of Japanese team Congratulations!

The championship in Poland deserved some critical assessment. A number of participants, including myself, were not happy with the location of the site of the event. However, the person representing the organization, Jacek Szczap, passed away very soon after the championship, which was shocking news for puzzlers all over the world. For years, Jacek was one of the central personalities of all WPF events. No doubt, he will be missed.

The General Assembly in Prapotnia produced some news regarding the structure of the WPF. It was decided that from 2011 on, the role of the secretary of the WPF will be a paid position. Since we cannot be satisfied with the worldwide promotion of our activities, it is really crucial that someone start an active and more aggressive promotion of our puzzles, events, competitors, etc. in order to attract sponsors and include more countries in our events. It will not be an easy task. Most of the member countries suffer some degree of recession, and sponsors are difficult to find.

In order to reduce the costs of sending teams to the championship, the General Assembly of the WPF voted to make the WPC and the WSC a combined event. In November 2011, we will witness first-hand how well this event will work out. No doubt, it will be a challenge for the organizers, as well as the competitors. The whole event will take place in Eger, Hungary. Previously, Debrecen was announced as the host city, but the organizers changed it to Eger, which hosted the WPC in 2005. Croatia as the next organizer will carefully observe the course of the event and hopefully benefit from the experience.

Will Shortz has been elected again as the Chairman of the Board of the WPF. Obviously, his enthusiasm did not leave him after two decades of his dedication and enormous contribution to WPF. One can only admire and wish him good leadership in the future.

# Report of the Meeting of the WPF Board

All board members present: Valter Kvalic, chairman; Peter Ritmeester, general secretary; Will Shortz, treasurer; Vitezslav Koudelka; and Kamer Alyanakyan.

## Summary of the discussion and decisions:

Board members were unanimous in feeling that they weren't adequately fulfilling their duties between general assemblies and that the WPF was not making sufficient progress. The board will recommend changing the WPF structure after 2011 to eliminate the general secretary position and to hire an executive to take a more active role in WPF affairs between general assemblies.

Examples of things an executive would do:

Oversee committees, checking to see that their work is being completed on time Work to make sure the WPF has candidates for office and WPC/WSC sites before each annual assembly

Make sure the WPC/WSC organizer is completing the puzzle creation on time so the work can be checked for fairness and so it is less likely to contain careless mistakes Make sure the WPC/WSC site is suitable Work to improve the website Seek sponsorship for the WPF and WPF events

Seek publicity for the WPF and WPF events

The executive would be a part-time position, most likely with an annual contract, and the person could be fired for not fulfilling the duties. The position would probably be filled by someone who is already within the WPF community. As the WPF currently takes in only about 10,000 euros a year, the salary could not be more than this without reducing savings.

Regarding sponsorship, the board

discussed whether the WPF should require members to print the logos of WPF sponsors on their websites and in at least one of their publications each year. No decision.

The board also discussed Gyorgy Istvan.s proposal for a 20th-anniversary WPC book, to be paid for partly or fully from WPF funds. Board members wanted to know more information before considering.

## Report on the 12th General Assembly of the World Puzzle Federation

The meeting was called to order by Valter Kvalic (Croatia) on October 26 at 14:50. It was held in two sessions over two days. Other board members present were Peter Ritmeester, general secretary (Netherlands), Will Shortz, treasurer (USA), Vitezslav Koudelka (Czech Republic), and Kamer Alyanakyan (Turkey).

The WPF members present were China, Croatia, Czech Republic, Estonia, Finland, France (which also voted by proxy for Belgium), Germany, Greece, Hungary (also voting for Romania), Italy, Japan, Netherlands (also voting for Denmark), Slovakia, Turkey, and the USA (also voting for the U.K.). Peter Ritmeester voted on behalf of South Korea. Also present but not voting were Belarus and Russia.

#### Reports

The minutes of the 2009 general assembly, as printed in the World Puzzle Newsletter 16, were approved.

Will presented the treasurer's report (distributed to the delegates). As of June 30, 2010, the WPF had a balance of 29,952.30 euros. This was an increase of a little more than 3,000 euros from the previous year. The report was accepted.

On behalf of the statutes committee (Peter, Will, and Gyorgy Istvan), Will reported that the group had thoroughly reviewed the statutes and bylaws and revised them to bring them up to date to current practice and to clarify and improve them in a few places. He said the revision would be posted shortly on the WPF website. He asked members to read and comment. The revision will be voted on at the 2011 general assembly.

#### Proposal for a Paid Executive

Will reported on the idea of the board of hiring an executive to handle day-to-day matters of the WPF [as listed in the board meeting report]. Gyorgy suggested that the executive could come from either inside or outside the board. Peter said it was important for the executive to be from outside the board, so he/she can be fired at any time.

Ferhat Calapkulu (Turkey) proposed an alternative format . the general assembly voting on a president and a new team. Gyorgy said he would like the terms of the board members to be concurrent. Peter said that continuity of administration is important. Vita said the board is not satisfied with its work, and that the purpose of the proposal is to semiprofessionalize the office of the WPF.

Gyorgy said he would like the general assembly (not the board) to elect the executive.

Valter proposed that a) the post of paid general secretary be eliminated starting with the 2011 general secretary, with it becoming just a regular board position; [b) that the board be instructed to prepare a proposal for a paid executive, listing duties and suggesting a salary; and c) members be invited to suggest alternatives to a paid executive as proposed by the board.] Vote: 18-0-2. Passed.

#### Website

Will suggested, as in the past, that the WPF website present more puzzles, contain the contents of all past newsletters, have results of past WPC's and WSC's, perhaps have original contests, post original puzzles, have more puzzle news, etc.

Juha Hyvonen (Finland) proposed giving the board authority to allot money to the website.

Gyorgy would like the website to be updated, and would like the board to oversee the webmaster. He also proposed that all WPC/WSC organizers send 10% of their puzzles to the website for posting, and added that a history of the WPC/WPF would be nice.

Ferhat proposed that national puzzle competitions be announced on the WPF website and that our site provide links to other websites that have puzzle competitions.

Nick Baxter (USA) said the U.S. had created an archive for past WSC puzzles, and he sent an email to all other members to provide puzzles. Only one country so far has done so.

Ferhat would like WPC playoffs be filmed and put on the website.

Valter said he would speak with Wei-Hwa, and he asked for volunteers to help update.

#### **Anniversary Book**

Gyorgy proposed that the WPF prepare 20thanniversary WPC book, containing about 124 pages, in 500 copies, containing photos of past WPC's, results, reminiscences, and sample puzzles.

Nick proposed making next year's Newsletter be a special 20thanniversary edition.

George Wang (China) asked who would edit and design the book?

Ferhat said he would like an archive of WPC puzzles, photos, and videos. These should be collected now before they're lost. He offered to compile these materials.

No action was taken on Gyorgy.s proposal.

#### **Statutes**

Will reported on the Statutes committee and gave examples of proposed changes.

He said the complete set of proposals would be posted on the WPF website soon for discussion, then voted on next year.

## Rules and Regulations

Vita read a partial report on proposed rules and regulations of competition.

Will praised report, but said that the rules on site selection belong in the Statutes committee report, not the one for Rules and Regulations.

He also pointed out that the report changes a previously voted-upon rule to disallow .B. teams. And he pointed out that the report provides no guidelines regarding playoffs, which have become an important part of the championships.

The report is to be posted on the WPF website.

Vita proposed that in future WPC's, the WPF promise the organizer 1,000 euros if the work is done properly and on time, this "reward" to be reduced for nonperformance.

#### Election of Board Members

For the two board positions to be filled, Will ran for reelection. Vita proposed Gyorgy for the position Valter was leaving. Both were elected unanimously.

#### 2012 WPC/WSC Site

No definitive offers for the 2012 WPC/WSC were made.

All members were to be notified that no host has been selected, and they have until December 31 to make an offer. If more than one offer is received, the selection of the 2012 WPC/WSC site will be made by online ballot.

#### Statement from the 2011 WPC/WSC Host

Gyorgy made a presentation on the 2011 WPC/WSC, tentatively to be held in October in Debrecen, Hungary, but possibly a different city. It will be held over eight days and seven nights, with one common day between events for sightseeing and possibly the general assembly session. There will be four-person teams for both the WSC and WPC. The WSC will be held first, the WPC last. The cost for the full eight davs will be no more than 550 euros. The WPC alone will cost no more than 400 euros. The WSC alone will cost no more than 350 euros.

Gyorgy asked for an exception to the rule about no .B. teams being allowed in the WPC, to give him more flexibility in planning the combined event. Individuals would compete officially, and teams would compete unofficially. All voted in favor, except for one abstention.

Gyorgy also asked for permission to require

playoff contestant to wear WPC sponsors' logos during playoffs. After discussion, no action was taken.

Gyorgy proposed a fiveperson committee to oversee 2011 WPC sponsorship -- Blanka, Kamer, Vita, Jacek, and Nick. This proposal was accepted without objection.

Gyorgy proposed putting the 2011 WPC/WSC website under the official WPF site. Nick said he and Wei-Hwa Huang can help Gyorgy do this.

#### Closing

Vita thanked Valter for his service to the WPF, as chairman and otherwise. Will thanked Valter for editing the newsletter.

Will thanked Jacek Szczap and his team for a well-run WPC.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned on October 27 at 12:35.

## In Memoriam - Jacek Szczap

On 17th of December 2010 Jacek Szczap passed away in the age of 56. Until his last days he was active and full of energy. He died two months after fulfilling one of his biggest dreams- organising World Puzzle Championship in Poland. In October 2010, in a small town near Warsaw, 105 solvers took part in WPC, coordinated by Jacek Szczap. Jacek was direct, energetic and frank. Despite his intransigence, Jacek was very out-going and gained friends easily. He always wanted to be in centre of attention.

For a very long time, he has been passionate about crosswords and puzzles. He was a very persistent solver- he never gave up until he reached the solution.

In 1979, Jacek graduated from Warsaw University of Technology with a very good mark. He studied power and aeronautical engineering. In the 1980's, Jacek worked as a constructor and a specialist in research centers and public institutions. Even back then, he tried to popularize puzzles and games in Poland by publishing a lot of articles in "Świat

młodych", a magazine for young people. After the Berlin Wall had fallen, Jacek began to work in media and marketing companies. He worked as a specialist in the biggest Polish publishing agencies, dealing with games and contests for newspapers, magazines, radio and websites. With help of the biggest newspaper in Poland, Jacek organised national contest called "Grey cells league", in which 60 000 of puzzlers took part in multi-stage competition, during which Polish Representation for World Puzzle

Championship in New York was found. In the same newspaper, Jacek introduced "Jolka", a crossword that a lot of readers quickly fell in love with. In this crossword, one is given descriptions of each word in the crossword, but without a place, in which he has to put it. Jacek cooperated with many magazines, publishing there (or in their extras) his crosswords and puzzles. For years, he was a member of the Board of Maths-Lovers Magazine. Afterwards, Jacek began working on his own, to fulfill a long-life dream- to lie on a couch and do nothing. He set up firms dealing with interactive marketing, sales promotion and marketing courses. In 1998, he was the first in Poland to found a company specializing in contests and marketing games. In cooperation with many training companies, Jacek gave many lectures on different conferences and conducted a lot of courses in the field of marketing. In 2000, he created a concept of Internet Cities- local websites all over Poland, based on a certain business model. A few websites were created in this way, among which the most

popular and important is Przystanek Praga (www.przystanekpraga. pl)- a site where informations for and about citizens of rightbank Warsaw are published. Jacek was a creator of many games, fan of taichi kung-fu, Interenet, literature, films and nature. Daddy of two sons- Piotr, born in 1982 (graduated from Warsaw University of Technology, in the subject of mathematics and information science) and Paweł, born in 1987 (studying Mongology and Tybetology on Warsaw University) and, from 1980, a husband of one wife- Maryla. In 1990's, Jacek helped to popularise International Contest in Maths and Logic Games. In 2004, he set up SFINKS organisation, and from the beginning aimed at hosting World Puzzle Championship in Poland. Every year, Sifnks organised Polish Puzzle Championship, during which representation for WPC was found. Another contest organised by Sfinks was Polish Puzzle Cup, where grid puzzles played less important role.

Through all these years, Jacek had one mottowe are looking for a World Champion. Happily for him and all Polish puzzlers, this objctive was completed when Jan Mrozowski won World Sudoku Championship in 2009 and 2010. Jacek wanted to publish puzzle books (he managed to publish two- one with puzzles from WPC in Hungary and one with sudokus from WSC in Prague). He had a plan of popularising puzzle by organising Inter-College Contests, based on the idea of Cambridge-Oxford rowing competition. Through all these years, Jacek reached to pass his passion onto others, ready to continue what he has started.

## Portrait of the Champion Taro Arimatsu

After 5th place in Oulu 2002, 7th place in Eger 2005 and 7th place again in Rio de Janeiro 2007, Taro did an effort to beat all the competition.

Taro Arimatsu was born on October 6, 1961. He graduated from Tokyo University in 1985 and immediately got employment with an industrial robot company as robot engineer. He lives in the vicinity of Fuji Mountain with his wife, two sons and two dogs. Since childhood, Taro was interested

in puzzles. During his high school days he discovered the magic world of logical puzzles, and read about the classic puzzlers Sam Lovd and Henry Dudeney, but he was especially fascinated by the work of Maurits Cornelis Escher of the Netherlands. During his student days, Nikoli and Sekaibunka begun publishing puzzle magazines, and they immediately drew the attention of Taro Arimatsu, although he was at that time devoted more to mechanical puzzles, especially to Rubik's Cube. At the age of 30, Taro

joined the Japanese Academy of Recreational Mathematics, where he was very much influenced by Nob Yoshihagara.Taro assisted him in creating



puzzles. For example, Taro Arimatsu created a software program to solve the Tokyo Parking puzzle in minimal steps. This puzzle was later released internationally under the name of Rush Hour. In 2002, Taro Arimatsu learned for the first time about puzzle championships, and he participated for first time in a domestic contest. Since then he earned his place on the Japanese national team nearly every year. However, he did not participate in all the World

Puzzle Championships because he could not get permission every year for an absence from work. In other words, his company did not appreciate his

wish to prove himself as one of the world's best puzzle solvers. But his presence at the WPC's did not pass unnoticed. In Oulu, Finland, in 2002. Taro ended fifth individually and contributed to Japan's team championship title. In Eger, Hungary, in 2005, Taro was second after two

days competition, but failed to achieve more than seventh place in the play-off.

In Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, in 2007, he was fifth after two days competition, then he was the best in semi-finals, and finally ended in fifth place. Finally in Paprotnia, Poland, in 2010, Taro was seventh after two days competition, and then was able to beat all the competition, bringing the first individual title to Japan.

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
## Kropki sudoku

Fill the grid whit digits 1-9, so that no digit is repeated in any row, column, or  $3 \times 3$  square with bolded borders. All neighboring grid cells containing digits whit difference 1 have a white dot between them. All neighboring grid cells, in which one digit is exactly two times higher than the other, have a black circle between them. Between the digits 1 and 2 there can be either a white or a black dot.





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
Paint the Snake


Fill some grid cells, so that the filled cells create a snake of the width of 1 cell, that cannot touch itself (not even diagonally). The head (H) and the tail (T) of the snake are given. Digits outside the grid represent, in order, the amount of filled fields in each filled segment in a respective row or column. Filled segments have to be separated whit at least one unfilled grid cell.

## Tapa Connection

Connect same letters with lines going horizontally or vertically, so that no two lines touch or overlap. All fields whit line parts have to be filled, so that there is a continuous filled area with no 2×2 square fully filled. Digits in some cells show the length of the group of filled grid cells neighboring with that cell. If in any grid cell there is more than one digit, than there has to be at least one unfilled cell between groups of filled grid cells. Grid cells, which are not a part of any line going between the same letters, cannot be filled.







## Skykuro

Place one digits from the 1-9 set in each empty cell of the diagram so that the horizontal sums of the digits are equal to the numbers given on the left and the vertical sums of digits are equal to the numbers given above. Digits in each sum cannot repeat. The digits inside the grid represent buildings whit a height equal to the digits value. One of the digits in each sum tells the amount of buildings visible from the bum in the row or column. Higher buildings hide lower ones.




